## Subfield Requirements

Students may qualify in International Relations either by exam or coursework.

To qualify in IR by exam, students must first take the two core courses. Other courses are highly recommended.

To qualify in IR by coursework, students must take the two core courses, plus one of the elective courses. Students may take one of those credits via transfer from another institution as approved by the DGS in consultation with the IR field coordinator. (Please note that Grand Strategy, courses in the Global Affairs Master's program, and other non-departmental graduate courses are not acceptable substitutes.) Additionally, students must write an IR-themed paper, in the context of an IR course, that shows a strong command of the substantive and methodological approaches in the field.
